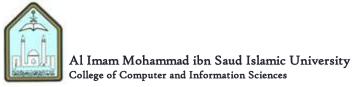

Attendance Policy:


Students should attend 80% of the overall course hours taught in the semester as per the University regulations.
